1. Key updates

NEW Letters to businesses: new trade arrangements with the EU from 1 January 2021: 18/10

 Actions businesses need to take to continue trading with the EU from 1 January 2021, in particular import and export declarations.

NEW Trading and moving endangered species protected by CITES from 1 Jan 2021: 14/10 NEW Trading CITES-listed specimens through UK ports/airports from 1 January 2021: 14/10

- You'll need CITES documents to move CITES specimens between Great Britain (England, Scotland and Wales) and the EU, and GB and NI, for species listed in Annexes A to D.
- You'll also need to use a <u>designated point of entry or exit</u> and present your documents to Border Force for endorsement.

NEW Moving CITES specimens through Eurotunnel from 1 January 2021: 14/10

Importing through Eurotunnel

- To <u>import CITES specimens</u> into the UK through Eurotunnel you must present your CITES documents at **Sevington** for endorsement by Border Force.
- Sevington Inland Border Facility, Junction 10A, Ashford (Aviva), Nightingale Close, Sevington, TN24 0TP.
- The Border Force office has a 24 hour service, Monday to Sunday.

Exporting through Eurotunnel

- To export CITES specimens from the UK through Eurotunnel you can present your CITES
 documents to Border Force at Ebbsfleet or at another suitable <u>designated point of entry</u>
 and exit sea port before you travel through Eurotunnel.
- Ebbsfleet Carpark D, Gravesend, DA10 1AE.
- The Border Force office has a 24 hour service, Monday to Sunday.

Moving CITES specimens through the Port of Dover from 1 January 2021: 14/10

- If you're <u>moving CITES specimens</u> through Dover Port you'll need to present your CITES documentation to Border Force for endorsement at **Dover Western Docks**.
- Freight Clearance Centre, Lord Warden Square, Western Docks, Dover, CT17 9EQ
 Signs at the port will direct you to the Freight Clearance Centre.
- The Border Force office has a 24 hour service, Monday to Sunday.

NEW Moving CITES specimens through Belfast Seaport from 1 January 2021: 14/10

- The Belfast Seaport address is: Unit 2, Block C, 6-10 Duncrue Crescent, Belfast Docks, Belfast, BT3 9BW.
- You can get to Belfast Seaport by exiting the M3 at Fortwilliam Roundabout, Belfast Harbor, Duncrue Crescent. Grid reference: GB000142.
- The office opening hours are Monday to Sunday, 9am to 4pm. You must enter the Border Force Belfast processing area no later than 3:30pm.

- The Home Office has <u>launched a new campaign</u> to help employers prepare for the introduction of the UK's new points-based immigration system.
- From 1 January 2021, you will need to be a licensed sponsor to hire eligible people from outside the UK. Becoming a sponsor normally takes eight weeks and fees apply.
- As a licensed sponsor, you will be able to recruit skilled workers from anywhere in the world, provided they meet certain <u>eligibility requirements</u>.

7. Exports, customs and borders

The Border Operating Model version 2: 08/10

- From 1 January 2021 UK export licences will not need to be physically endorsed by Border Force Officers. However, traders/hauliers are advised to retain a physical copy of the licence and present to Border Force Officers if requested to do so. (p196)

Border controls

Import controls: 10/02/20

Declaring goods brought into Great Britain from the EU from 1 January 2021: 10/07/20

Border controls are being introduced in stages:

- From January 2021: basic customs requirements, such as keeping sufficient records of imported goods, and will have up to six months to complete customs declarations.
- From April 2021: All products of animal origin and all regulated plants and plant products will also require pre-notification and the relevant health documentation.
- From July 2021: Traders will have to make declarations at importation and pay tariffs.

Moving goods under the Northern Ireland Protocol: 07/08

Guidance for businesses engaging in new processes under the Northern Ireland protocol.

Apply to import goods temporarily to the UK or EU: 20/01

• How to apply for Temporary Admission to import goods into the UK or EU and use them for up to 2 years or more, before re-exporting them.

Check customs and duties procedures for exporting goods

The UK has announced its new tariff regime the UK Global Tariff (UKGT): 19/05/20

 The UKGT will replace the EU's Common External Tariff on 01/01/2021. It will apply to goods exported from countries with which the UK does not have a preferential agreement.

- North Weald Airfield
- Ebbsfleet International Rail Station car park D
- Stop 24

HGVs will need to go to Manston Airport.

Import through Eurotunnel

• Go to Ashford International Truck Stop.

Import through the Port of Dover

• Go to Dover Western Docks.

Moving goods through the Port of Holyhead with an ATA Carnet: 19/09/19

The Port of Holyhead cannot process ATA Carnets - go to Roadking Truckstop.

CITES

<u>Trading and moving endangered species protected by CITES from 1 January 2021: 14/10 </u>
<u>Trading CITES-listed specimens through UK ports and airports from 1 January 2021: 14/10</u>

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- You'll also need to use a <u>designated point of entry or exit</u> and present your documents to Border Force for endorsement.
- Endangered species: imports and exports:updated 10/06/20
- Musical instrument certificate: FED0172
- Endangered species: apply for a travelling exhibition certificate

Exporting and importing CITES specimens

- Moving CITES specimens through Eurotunnel from 1 January 2021: 14/10
- Moving CITES specimens through the Port of Dover from 1 January 2021: 14/10
- Moving CITES specimens through Belfast Seaport from 1 January 2021: 14/10

Through Eurotunnel

- Export go to Ebbsfleet or another suitable designated point of entry and exit sea port
- Import go to **Sevington** near Ashford immediately after you arrive

Through Dover

• Export or import - go to **Dover Western Docks**.

Through Belfast

• Export or import - go to Belfast Seaport.

Eurostar is not a designated port for CITES.

Cultural object licences

- Exporting objects of cultural interest from 1 January 2021: 16/10

European firearms requirements from 1 January 2021: updated 14/10

• UK residents no longer able to apply for a European Firearms Pass from 1 January 2021.

9. Services

Selling services to the EU, Switzerland, Norway, Iceland & Liechtenstein: updated 14/10/19 Providing services/business travel to EU, Switzerland, Norway, Iceland and Liechtenstein

We will no longer operate under EEA regulations for cross-border trade in services from 1
January. The rights and protections provided by the EU Directives and EU Treaty rights of
freedom of movement and freedom of establishment will no longer apply to the UK.

10. Data protection and intellectual property

Data protection

Using personal data in your business during and after transition period: updated 16/10

- From 1 January 2021, your organisation may need to have Standard Contractual Clauses (SCCs) in place with EU counterparts in order to legally receive personal data from the EU.
- The EU's data adequacy assessment of the UK is underway. If the UK is assessed as adequate by the end of the transition period, the free flow of personal data can continue.
- If the EU has not made an adequacy decision by that time, you should act to ensure you can lawfully receive personal data from EU/EEA businesses and others in the future.

EU Funding

Getting EU funding: 05/08

The UK will participate in programmes funded under the 2014-2020 Multiannual Financial Framework until their closure. You will continue to get any EU funding awarded, including funding due after 31/12/2020. It has not yet been decided what funding UK organisations will be able to apply for after the spending framework ends.

You can apply for EU funding under the current spending framework depending on the fund
